LA CTE Leadership Academy - Day 3 Highlights

Great final day where we consolidated the gains of the first two days . . . dived deep into basic Jump Start policy . . . set the foundation for detailed Enterprise Modeling . . . and started our Advocacy efforts.

- 1) Detailed review of CTE funding sources: a) CDF funds; b) CTE Adder; c) SCA funds; d) other entries described in the CTE Funding Guidance Sources memo. (Note: July MFP remittances with the new larger CDF payments will go out on/about July 25.)
- 2) Review of the Enterprise Modeling resource, including a trial run of the SPS Point Calculator spreadsheet. This resource offers step-by-step guidance for creating vision-driven CTE program revitalization plans, along with estimates of how creating new student opportunities can raise a school / district letter grade. Your homework assignments will result in the development of *Better CTE Program Selling Packages* on implementing the VWE II course and a new high-demand pathway that you can actually use in your schools / districts.

This November we will use the more-detailed District Enterprise Modeling Spreadsheet to create multi-school district-level Jump Start revitalization plans. Prior to that in-person training we will hold a series of webinars that explore the use of this spreadsheet.

3) Guest Speaker appearance by Dr. Lisa Vosper. As a member of the Louisiana NSFY team, Dr. Lisa provided her perspective on the highlights of our NSFY innovation investments.

Key Dr. Lisa advice: a) CASE: copy and 'share' everything; b) "Fail forward" - failure is good when it provides key learning moments and clarifies future opportunities; c) "We have to engage those who we might like to silence" - focus on how you can work with oppositional stakeholders to build common understanding and the foundation for joint efforts.

Final thought: "What you're learning in the Academy will help you transform CTE in Louisiana. Once you master these capabilities, it would be irresponsible of you not to create positive change."

4) Advocacy: we completed a review of basic advocacy methods, and discussed the imperative of "changing the narrative" on CTE.

Best insight - using the implicit stigma against CTE as the springboard for changing the narrative: "Do you want your student to go to college? Do you want your student to go to college with a competitive advantage?"

Teams collaborated on a case study of CTE program advocacy. We analyzed: a) the characteristics of effective mission statements (brevity, cadence, "warm words," leveraging existing brand value of associated initiatives); b) key features of effective outreach to different target stakeholders; and c) developing a variety of advocacy goals that are objective, sequenced temporally and balanced in terms of strategic objectives.

5) Jason led a review of the many features / benefits of the www.lacteleaders.com website, including our plans for creating crowd-sourced best-practices implementation resources. We also discussed the likely site of the Nov 12 - 14 in-person training session (somewhere in Baton Rouge).

This was a great launch for the Academy. Laura, Jason and I hope you're all home safe, energized to transform CTE in your school, district and our state.
